Embracing Aging

As a gerontologist and edu-

cator, I have been teaching courses on aging-related issues and topics for the past 15 years. I often have students study the lyrics of the Beatles song, When I'm 64. It is a useful exercise and illustration that, as social creatures, we decide how to make meaning of age. In class we pore over the lyrics and deconstruct the meaning behind the song. We reflect on what Paul McCartney imagined 64 would be like when he wrote the lyrics in 1967, as a 16-year-old young man. He saw the 64 year olds in his world losing their hair, needing assistance with activities of daily living and some simply wasting away [as referenced in the song lyrics].

In 1967, the average life expectancy was 68 years. In 2015, it was 79. Contrast that to 1900, when average life expectancy was 47 years. More and more people are living longer, in greater numbers and are now dying with complications associated with aging and chronic disease rather than from acute and infectious diseases, which were prevalent earlier in the 20th century. Adding decades

to the life course has dramatically changed how we perceive and experience aging, too.

We can look around and see that in many respects 65 is the new 50. People are continuing to retire at 65 after which many reinvent themselves for their second half

of life. This has become a time of contribution and productivity, through volunteering or engaging in generative acts. For some, later life is a time where people blossom and successfully tap into creative insights, deep wisdom and complete individuality. Gerontologists and other social scientists used to lump "old age" into one broad category - the 65 plus age group. More recently, they have started to use 3 distinct categories: the young-old (65 to 74), the middleold (75 to 84) and the oldest-old (85+ with centenarians being 100+). The time after people retire until they live with inhibiting health conditions and disabilities associated with late life has become known as the Third Age. Continued on page 3


ALOA raised

The phenomenon of the Third Age is as a period of a healthy, productive, secure and engaged retirement. With a growing proportion of the U.S. population realistically anticipating the ability to retire and yet remain active for a

number of years, the Third Age has taken shape as





an unprecedented opportunity to enrich the experience of aging

by providing a new and expanded model of old age to precede and, in many cases, supersede a traditional view of a period of inevitable decline.

It was once that old age, marked by the transition into retirement, was the start of a long period of decline and disengagement from society. That is no longer the case. It is now estimated that once a person retires they will experience several additional major life transitions. These transitions can include re-entry into the labor force or launching an entirely new career, moving, losing a spouse or other loved ones, new relationships or remarrying, becoming a caregiver, managing the onset of illness or learning to live on a fixed income. Part of reimagining old age is navigating these transitions and making meaning of these new life ages and stages. Old age is being conceptualized as a time that holds the possibility for

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continued development, personal fulfillment and increasing levels of life satisfaction and well-being. Paul McCartney, now 73, is enjoying the many opportunities that an old age "reimagined" is affording him. As a gerontologist, I understand these changing perceptions of aging to be positive and encouraging, giving us hope for what the next 10 years have in store for how we will understand, perceive, define, experience, and make meaning of old age and later life.

Congregations Embracing Aging

- Faith Community Lutheran Church, Las Vegas, NV, is being intentional about older adult ministries and brought members and community residents together for a "Joyfully Aging" experience. They plan a similar event this year, where older adults can connect with one another, as well as learn, pray, serve and celebrate together.
- At Concordia Lutheran Church, Cordova, CA, the aging congregation saw a need in their community, and decided to do something about it. Working with an occupational therapist, they created a Health/medical Equipment Loan Program, (H.E.L.P), to provide for for persons in their community who cannot afford to purchase needed items to live comfortably and safely!

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IN THE WORDS OF.... CHARLES MUELLER

A continuing series of interviews with veteran leaders in senior adult ministry

Rev. Charles S. Mueller Sr., Missouri Synod pastor and former district president, is the "Charlie" of Rich and Charlie Resources, a free, monthly online newsletter targeted to younger and older adults, richandchar*lieresources.com*. In addition to writing and speaking on behalf of Wheat Ridge Ministries, he staffs the adult education ministry of Trinity Lutheran Church, Roselle, Illinois.

Years ago, you were deeply involved in the launch of what became ALOA, by setting up a pan-Lutheran committee to explore possibilities for serving those who were called "seniors." How did you settle on the name? **Mueller:** Someone suggested we call the organization ALOHA, as the Hawaiian word meant both "Hello" and "Goodbye". We felt that is what happens as people move into the post-60 season. As we noodled around the name, we deleted the "H" to produce an acronym for what the group felt was a good starting point: Association of Lutheran Older (give the dog a name) Adults (we were not just starting a grown up "youth" group...as some senior organizations try to be).

What is the story behind the ALOA logo?

Mueller: The initial symbol was the brainchild of a professional designer: four hands that formed a cross. That was a visualization of what the group saw as its two-fold purpose: 1) Celebrate and 2) Serve.

More recently, why did you launch the Rich and Charlie Resources newsletter?

Mueller: It grew out of the friendship that Rich and I had developed over the years. R and C Resources was created to inform, support and encourage individuals, families, pastors and lay leaders at the local level.

What is the biggest problem facing senior adult ministry?

Mueller: The #1 problem facing those who want to serve the post-60 population is the denial of what being and/or becoming older is. It is at the heart of how almost all parish leaders from the pastor on up (or down-depending on your view), regional and national church bodies and most organizations that try or want to serve "seniors" (ALOA included) treat the post-60 reality.

You appear to feel strongly that age-related denial is the primary hindrance to ministry. Mueller: The post-60 world is huge and growing by the day. As I see it age relateddenial is a huge problem no matter how and in what corner of the world a person seeks to serve – as much with the serving organization as with those they serve.

Wayne Dyer, Max Planck and a lot of others agree that, "When we change the way we look at a thing the thing we look at changes." Individually and collectively we need to readjust how we view the post-60 years. Bismarck's 19th century views that if you make it to 65 you "fold up your tent" and retire is 21st century nonsense.



Thank you to The Dankis Christian Foundation

The Dankis Christian Foundation has funded the taping of the next series of ALOA video resources and the purchase of additional equipment. A total of \$7,500 from the foundation has been utilized to purchase a camera, teleprompter and studio set equipment for Prince of Peace Lutheran School in Carrollton, Texas to use for this project.

"How affirming to receive funding for this cross-generational project!" says creator and ALOA Board member Dr. Mary Manz Simon. "We are grateful for this grant money that will directly benefit old and young."

High school students tape and produce the videos in their classroom, under the direction of instructor Nick Weiss. Each student is assigned one video, where they not only apply skills developed during the year, but are exposed to issues in senior adult ministry. The new equipment will also be used for Faith Stories, a project that makes it easy to share one's faith journey. Produced in partnership with Prince of Peace, Faith Stories is being field-tested this spring as another ALOA intergenerational video initiative. *aloaserves.org*


The day when congregations practice an attitude that says – older adult ministry is intentional, inclusive, adequately staffed, resourceful and builds and shares faith.
