What comes to mind when

you hear the word Intergenerational? Do you have a picture of where that happens and who is there? Does it happen often? Is the energy generated by the event or interaction strongly positive, negative or neutral? When was the last time you were part of an intergenerational event or interaction yourself? Did you enjoy the experience? Would you do it, or something like it, again? Where in the list of generations are you? Are all intergenerational experiences the same or are some just multi-generational and the generations just happen to be in the same place at the same time? How many generations are represented in your current extended family?

Lots of questions. It is worth thinking about the generations - and the times they come together. Let's start with naming the generations, starting with the oldest. We've seen and heard the names before:

• The GI Generation: Born 1901-1924 (age 95+) There are more of these folks than you might think!

- The Silent Generation: Born 1925-1945 (now ages 74-94)
- Baby Boomers: Born 1946 – 1964 (now

ages 55-73)

- Generation X: Born 1965-1976 (now ages 43-54)
- Millennials or Gen Y: Born 1977-1995 (now ages 24-42)
- Gen Z, iGen, or Centennials: Born 1996–??? (now under 23)

I remember rare times in our family when, around the same table, we had Great Grandparents, Grandparents, Parents and then the kids. The conversation was lively and one story would spark another one as the Great Grandparents spoke of a time the youngest two generations present knew nothing about.



ALOA's purpose: Equipping persons in the second half of life as disciples of Jesus Christ for their service to family, church, community and world.

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It happened more than once that we got to the end of the evening and someone lamented: "Oh no! We forgot to start the recorder to catch all those stories!". I've never been in a room with more than four generations present, have you? It can happen - late nineties or older down to a toddler. Now that is a stretch of time!

The six generations listed outline the differences between the ages. As the culture changes, so do the experiences of growing up and living. All those experiences shape the generation, especially during their formative years. Are the generations interacting with each other? While the media might seem to emphasize the differences, there is good evidence (*Barna, Research Releases in Culture and Media*, March 12, 2019) to suggest that they ARE interacting: twothirds of Americans say they have a close friend who is either 15 years older or younger than they are. And an April 9, 2015 article in *Aging Today* affirms the very strong



influence that Grandparents have on their family.

How about you and your family — and your church

family? Take a quick inventory of the times when meaningful conversations are happening across a generation or two or three. (Really give that list some thought!) There are probably more times that the genera-

tions are in the same space and time, but without much interaction. Did you come up with many regular opportunities for meaningful conversations between generations? I hope so! We think ALOA

can be helpful in growing that list.

Our website (*www.aloaserves.org*) has some excellent resources to encourage and facilitate meaningful intergenerational interaction. Every generation has unique things to offer. It is worth noting what the Bible says about the powerful contributions of older adults to the community. Check out:

- Job 32:7
 - Proverbs 20:29
- Proverbs 16:31 Job 12:12

Clearly, wisdom, experience and understanding of older adults have long been valued. We encourage intentionality in sharing, with regular opportunities over time rather than a single flurry of activity that effectively disappears quickly.

- **1.** Faith StoriesTM a resource to help older adults work with a young person to produce a video testimony of their faith and life story. We've included some detailed "how-to" documents, so anyone can do it. This is useful for anyone who wants to make a permanent statement for the coming generations (imagine your Great, Great, Great Grandchildren watching and listening to you tell about the important things of your life!). It is also worth considering as a church project between the older adults and High School youth. You can see a sample of what it might look like on the "howto" page. Powerful stuff! Clearly this is deeply meaningful to the person sharing. We can't help but think it will carry weight with the family members who hear it - whenever that is.
- 2. Lessons I Learned In Life by Rev Robert Zimmer These are the lessons Bob wants to pass on to his family. They can be an excellent conversation starter between generations in your own family. The book contains 34 short lessons (usually a single page or so) in an easy-to-read format. A Study Guide is also available, with suggestions for congregational use. And Bob didn't stop with the book. He continues to write weekly notes (by email) to his extended family about

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what is important to him. Are they listening? Good question. One thing for sure: if Bob doesn't write it, there is nothing

to listen to! He has had Grandkids tell him they are saving them all. Hooray!



- 3. Short Format Videos There are variety of short videos (think 2-3 minutes) on intergenerational topics available for discussion starters for families, small groups and Bible Studies.
- 4. Cross+Gen Life A website with a variety of resources for connecting the generations.

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Showing Up: *The Why*

At ALOA, we believe it's important to "show up" face-to-face, as often as possible, in order to EncourAGE and Equip Congregations for Older Adult Ministry. For a quick look at what we mean by Encour-AGE and Equip, check out the Blueprint for Congregational Ministry link on our home page at *aloaserves.org*.

The thing is, showing up can look very different than it once did. Showing up used to mean a plane or car trip and a physical body in the room. These days, it can be that and much more. The gaming industry has shown us that virtual connections are every bit as strong as "real" ones. We once thought that relationships started through a computer game and existing over an internet connection were not *real* relationships. Studies now show that friends who've met only through a computer game can know each other well and genuinely care about one another. They might meet eventually, but when they do it will be more like old friends picking up after an absence than new friends introducing themselves to each other. So perhaps a better expression would be "virtual" vs "in person."

ALOA is now showing up electronically. It is a great way to share resources, and to have conversations and build relationships for strengthening ministry in local congregations. Best of all, it is an insanely cost effective way to do this! We currently have two main ways that can happen:

1. Webinars

2. Consultations/Conversations

For both of those we utilize the computer, tablet or phone with **Zoom** as the way we connect. Perhaps you're thinking or know someone who'd think or say, "That works for

them, but I'm pretty sure it won't for us". Reasons vary:

- "I have no idea what Zoom is"
- "I'm pretty sure it won't work on my computer"
- "You can't accomplish much that way"
- "I've never done it that way before!"

The only way to really know if it will work is to try it. The good folks at Mount Olive Lutheran Church in Poway, CA were willing, and it took just one practice session to make sure the connections were working. Then, all of us had a conversation about Older Adult Ministry in a church and community setting. For what it's worth, everyone in the room at Mount Olive was over 70 (including the tech guy who set it up).

Here's what some participants had to say:

The Zoom presentation went very well, and created quite a bit of buzz. One of our LWML women was very enthusiastic, not just about the video presentation concept, but about the amazing things you are trying to accomplish.

Webinars

ALOA's plan is to hold up to two webinars per month, focused on providing resources to congregations for stronger, sustainable older adult ministry that equips disciples/ stewards for faithful service to the end. We have two scheduled in June (June 12 & 18) and any number of people can take part. It is easy to sign up and participate. Consultations/Conversations

These are much more interactive than the webinar format and include far fewer people. We still use the Zoom platform, but as a video "meeting" so that everyone can see all the participants and join in conversations, similar to the experience in an "in person" meeting. This format enables ALOA to hold conversations about what is happening

in local congregations and to offer suggestions and resources for taking intentional steps forward. To allow for the best interaction among participants, we are limiting these to no more than five or six congregations (9 or 10 people) at



one time. It is an excellent and cost-effective way to have meaningful engagement without the time and money involved in travel. To find out more and sign up, go to *aloaserves*. org/events/webinars/ and scroll down to the consultation link.
