Toolkit to Support Congregational Ministry

While personal contact and ALOA's work to encourage older adult ministry is currently constrained, we thank God that effective work is still being done! In this age of online connections, groups have still been able to meet and we've been able to maintain our regular schedule of enriching webinars. ALOA is even participating in LCMS District conferences as a virtual exhibitor (check it out online at *virtualexhibithall.lea.org*)!

Among the work being done is a focused effort to make progress on ALOA's Congregational Centers for Vital and Resilient Aging program. Initial work on the first component, the Older Adult Ministry Toolkit, is well underway.

Following on the heels of the Toolkit will be development of Congregational Consultations. These will be developed as video conferencing or in person sessions, depending on the needs and size of the congregation, as well as current health guidelines. The final component of the program is the creation of Congregational Cohort groups. These regional group-

ings aim to facilitate the sharing of experiences between congregations, enabling them to become a resource for each other.



We are grateful for the support of the ELCA and the Lutheran Services for the Elderly Endowment in providing financial support for this new and vital effort in support of congregations and the older adults they serve.

What's In the Toolkit?

A guide to congregations in the development or strengthening of intentional older adult ministries, the Older Adult Ministry Toolkit will cover four main areas for programming:

- Spiritual
- Educational
- Community building/Social
- Intergenerational

Background information to form a shared understanding of each area, along with listings and descriptions of trusted resources will be included.

hope, "the redemption of our bodies," for which we are earnestly waiting. He goes on in verses 24 and 25:


For in this hope we were saved. Now hope that is seen is not hope. For who hopes for what he sees?

Spirituality

The concept of spirituality is expansive, multi-dimensional and runs deep. At its core, it is engaging the "sacred" to find **an enduring sense of meaning, purpose and hope.** Faith, a particular dimension of spirituality, utilizes religious communities, sacred practices and religious resources to engage certain understandings of God and God's activity in one's life and the life of the world.

Being grounded in faith, older adults become more resilient, visionary and resourceful. They rely on their faith communities as ongoing webs of sacred connections and trusted relationships as well as avenues for service. This section will cover a variety of spirituality and faith perspectives as well as sacred moments, vital faith practices and enduring hope.

Education

This area will address the unique health and lifestyle issues faced by older adults. We're working to develop a practical blueprint for programs within congregations that encourage collaboration between congregations and community organizations which can address the issues faced by older adults and empower them to age with confidence. Community partners can be excellent resources for programming in congregations on issues like:

- Physical topics like brain health or fall prevention
- Social issues such as end of life planning and communication between generations
- Help with challenges of aging such as depression and attitude/coping skills

The Toolkit will also feature presentations that congregations can use to get educational programs started, including Aging 101 and caregiver resource workshops.

Community Building / Social

Many older adults experience social isolation and loneliness, which causes associated physical and mental health issues. Although topics like these are addressed in part by the Education section of the Toolkit, intentional community building within the congregation as well as the community engages and connects older adults in meaningful ways.

This is more than fellowship. The key is to create connections <u>intentionally</u>, whether physical or virtual, one-on-one or in small groups. Models for programming, activities and events will vary widely to serve the needs of congregations of all sizes.

Intergenerational

Passing on a legacy of belief to the next generations speaks to the very heart of the Christian faith. The inter-connectedness of faith communities nurtures reciprocal value across the generations in very natural ways. The importance of intergenerational connections can not be overlooked. We'll include a bank of ideas and activities that congregations can easily access in categories that include Grandparenthood, age integration and telling your Faith Story (click on the Faith Story button on our website to find tools to help with that now).

We are excited about development of the Older Adult Ministry Toolkit and will share more about its upcoming availability soon.


Resource Highlights

I heard the voice of the Lord saying, 'Whom shall I send, and who will go for us?' Isaiah 6:8

What Does A Holistic View

of life's third age (60+) mean to followers of Jesus? What should we understand about this amazing longevity era of which we are a part? Is it different when a follower of Jesus "retires" or are the expectations in retirement for us the same as for every-body else?

We live in a society, especially in the Western world, where Webster's Dictionary definition of "retirement" fits well on one hand and is completely outdated on the other. Webster says "retirement" means to "leave" or "withdraw," or "disappear." This may be true on one level when we wave "goodbye" to fellow business or professional colleagues and we are handed our final separation paycheck. We may have left, we may have withdrawn, but we didn't disappear.

So What Did Happen?

We went fishing. We traveled. We played more golf. We did something we'd always dreamed about doing. Pretty much like any retiree. Or maybe not. Maybe we don't do any of those things. Maybe the unexpected happens. Maybe we have health issues. Maybe we need extra income. Maybe

grandchildren become our responsibility. Maybe retirement is not anything like we dreamed it would be.

The Christian and non-Christian retiree enters a similar new era. Some are well enough financially to retire in their 50's. For others it may be in their 60's or even early 70's. Yet it is the same for all. At whatever age one retires, the follower of Jesus steps into new territory just like anyone else, often unprepared for what comes next.


How to prepare financially is covered by a plethora of books, advisors, and entities set up solely to enable our readiness to face life without the proverbial paycheck. Our hope for the future is that we all do well as good stewards of whatever our resources may be. Too much can be a burden. Too little a problem. "Enough" is the right amount. What constitutes enough's "right amount" is another conversation

Today We View Retirement

as a right, not a privilege. Yet a hundred years ago, most people did not retire. In the US, in 1935, Social Security was launched as a way out of the Great Depression. When 65-year-old, lifelong Republican, Ida Mae Fuller of Ludlow, Vermont, opened her mail in February, 1940, she found a check enclosed, dated January 31, for \$22.40. It was the first Social Security payout ever from the US government. Over her lifetime she received almost 1,000 times more than what she paid into the system.

My father was born in 1900. Life expectancy at that time was only 47. In the 1930's at the inception of Social Security, life expectancy in the US was 62. Today it is 79. But it's not just longevity that is impressive. Everyday another 10,000 American boomers retire. Think about it. There are more than a billion people in the world who make up life's third age. In 1900, only 122,000 people aged 85+ in the US. In 2020, there are nearly 6.7 million, a number more than the total population of the US in 1800.1

So as we try to catch our breath and celebrate our third life age birthdays, what is it that the One True God expects we will do with our longevity largess? Will freedom and fun be the end all? 
In addition to our study and music/devotions, the program includes topics of local interest and optional outdoor activities.
