Several years ago, Bob Buford authored the book, *Half Time*. The book described his journey from a life of "success" to a journey to "significance." In the first half, he states, "in our lives

The gift of aging gives us the op-

portunity to reframe our lives, to prioritize what's most significant and purposeful. Several months ago, I was diagnosed with pancreatic cancer. After many tests, three months later I was told there was no cancer. After

hearing this, I prayed, "what

now, Lord, what do you want me to do with the rest of my life?" The answer is still moving around in my heart. What now? What will be my legacy? For what will I be remembered?

> My mentor reminded me "it is not retirement, but 'refirement.'" Buford in his book mused about what he wanted on his tombstone. He said, "100x's, taken from the Parable of the Sower in Matthew 13."

He wanted to be remembered as the seed that was planted in the good soil of his heart and multiplied a hundredfold. What do you want to be remembered for?

Many seniors feel insignificant, they no longer have a career where they found worth and affirmation. Many suggest others no longer see them as relevant.

In the movie City Slickers, trail boss, Curly, said to the boys on the trail, "You city boys come out here to get the knots out of your rope, none of you get it. The secret of life, is just one thing.' What is it?' they ask. 'That's what you need to figure out.'"

God has programmed your "one thing." Ephesians 2:8-10 says that we are *saved* by grace through faith for a purpose: we are God's workmanship, his work of art, released into the world to accomplish his purposes. **Our calling is to discover our**

10 Ways for Your Congregation to Encourage a Culture of Aging With Purpose

- 1. Create a task force on Abundant Aging that includes multiple generations.
- 2. Assess opportunities currently available in your congregation for older adults for
 - Services
 - Support
 - Leadership
 - Volunteer ministry
 - Connection to other generations
 - Learning
 - The Arts
- Listen to your older adults when they describe the "holes" in opportunities your congregation provides. What would they like to see your congregation provide? How might they help create and publicize these opportunities?
- Consider which opportunities currently offered by your congregation might be adapted to the needs of older adults who:
 - Need a ride to an event
 - No longer drive in the dark and need meetings or events during daylight hours
 - Need their volunteer or part time work schedules to be considered
 - Might be partnered with a person with greater strength or physical stamina to lead Sunday school, care for children in the nursery, or serve in other ways in the congregation
- Identify needs in your community that might offer opportunities for older adults to use their gifts, skills, passions and time to serve the community, such as:
 - Reading buddies in a local elementary school
 - Staffing a latch key program after school, so children are not home alone
 - Teaching wood working skills to interested youth
- Cooking and serving community meals *aloaserves.org*

- 6. Offer older adults a chance to
 - Update or write a will
 - Create an advanced medical directive
 - Consider end of life planning
 - · Learn more about estate planning
 - Consider pre-planning their funeral or memorial service
- Invite youth to interview older adults about their life experiences, their values, their accomplishments or their faith. Videotape these interviews for the individual, for the congregation's archives, and as a legacy to those who will survive them.
- 8. Develop faith milestones for:
 - Retirement
 - Employment or volunteer experiences
 - Service to the community
 - Celebrating milestone birthdays
 - Surviving the death of a spouse or partner or dear friend
 - Moving out of the family home
 - Moving into senior or assisted living
 - Funeral or memorial service

Faith milestones include an opportunity to name this transition as a part of a life of faith, as leaving a treasured place or part of life, of moving into and embracing new opportunities.

- Make sure that the needs, concerns and celebrations of older adults are present in the prayers of the people and in sermon illustrations.
- 10. Lead a study on *Abundant Aging: Living the Second Half of Your Life on Purpose,* a small group study published by Lutheran Social Service of Minnesota.

ALOA Trip to Italy, Germany & The Passion Play

On September 20, 2022, 25 excited and spirit-driven people traveled with ALOA to experience an 11-day tour of Italy and the Oberammergau Passion Play. This iconic play has been presented in "zero" years since its inception in 1680, but was rescheduled to 2022 due to the pandemic.



First, we were off to Rome, where our





to Basilica of Saint John Lateran, the Holy Steps where Luther received his insights into the meaning of faith, the Colosseum, Vatican City and the Basilica of St. Peter. We toured the Sistine Chapel, the tomb of the Apostle Paul and the Church of Three Fountains, where Paul was executed.

Next, it was off to Florence and Assisi to visit the medieval town, the Basilica of Santa Maria Degli Angeli and the pre-



served chapels of the Church of St. Mary of the Angels. We took in the Cathedral, Giot-

to's bellow tower and the Baptistry, to admire Ghiberti's bronze gates of Paradise. After a traditional Italian lunch, we viewed



Michelangelo's statue of David and had a guided tour of the Uffizi Gallery. Continuing on to Padua, we visited the 14th century Scrovegni Chapel with Giotto's frescoes depicting stories from the life of the Virgin and Christ.

Venice included a walking tour, travel by water taxi and a tour of the Byzantine St. Mark's Basilica and the Doges Palace. During Venice's "high tide," the city erected walking platforms for our convenience. We visited many of the 117 islands that are linked by canals and bridges, enjoy lunch on the Grand Canal and, yes, we crossed the Bridge of Sighs!

We arrived at our traditional Bavarian hotel just in time for an authentic 3-course German meal, lots of great fellowship with our group and a very entertaining group of German travelers also staying in the hotel.

In Oberammergau, we had an opportunity to explore and visit the many cuckoo clock vendors. We visited a quaint Lutheran church right next to the Passion Play The-



ater. The pastor was extremely welcoming and conducted the service in English and German. It was so special to

have Holy Communion during our trip and join in this worship service prior to the Passion Play.

More than 2000 participants presented the story of Jesus of Nazareth in a five-hour performance in the world's largest, covered, open-air auditorium, with a three-hour meal

break in the middle. The play covered the period of Jesus entering Jerusalem until his



death and resurrection. Some 450,000 visitors take in the Passion Play each decade.

After a short night's sleep, we began our trip to Munich to fly home. Our 11-day journey was full of memories, our group enjoyed a terrific mix of ages and backgrounds and some wonderful friendships were formed. This trip was truly incredible!
